*Likely* means something has a **higher** chance of happening. *Unlikely* means something has a **lower** chance of happening.

#### EXAMPLE

You are pulling toys out of a bag.



There are 3 cars in the bag

There are more cars

So you are more *likely* to pick a car


There are 2 boats in the bag

There is 1 plane in the bag

There are fewer planes


