

Recognizing Place Values

Topic: CCSS 5.NBT.A.1 - Recognize that in a multi-digit number, a digit in one place represents 10 times as much as it represents in the place to its right and 1/10 of what it represents in the place to its left.

Summary:

- Base-Ten System
 - In our number system, the position of the digit in a number defines its value.
 - Each place value is 10x larger than the place value directly to its right and 1/10x smaller than the place value directly to its left.
 - In the number 13,592, the 3 is in the thousands place and represents 3,000. In the number 26,341, the 3 is in the hundreds place and represents 300.
